# RES' Safe & Positive Learning Environment

### Peanut/Nut, Shellfish, and Egg-Safe Environment:



We are very appreciative to all parents, staff, and RES students who have been collaborating with us to closely monitor our children's lunches/snacks to ensure that all food items are allergen-safe. If your child has a severe allergy and you have not yet notified the school, please contact the school secretary, Mrs. Agnew, @ 523-7152.

### **Bus Safety Questions:**

- 1) Are students allowed to <u>eat</u> whilst traveling <u>on</u> one of our provincial <u>school</u> <u>buses? NO</u>, this could result in a child choking if the bus had to stop suddenly.
- 2) Are students allowed to talk on the bus? YES, using a soft, respectful voice.
- 3) Does a parent/guardian have to be in the yard for a District 16 bus drivers to permit their child to disembark off of the school bus? <u>YES</u>, students 11 years or younger are required by law to be supervised by an adult or a child who is 12 years old.
- 4) Does Rexton Elementary allow bus transfers? <u>NO</u>. If an authentic emergency arises (hospitalization, car accident, death in the family, etc.) we will of course do our utmost to assist your family. Our first priority is the safety of all of our students. However, arranging bus transfers, for convenience sake, compromises the safety of all of students and interrupts our learning environment. With over 20 buses, 13 classes, 258 students and numerous supply teachers, secretaries and bus drivers we cannot risk the chance that a child will go on the wrong bus or to an empty home! Instead of writing a note asking for a bus transfer we recommend that RES parents contact a family member or neighbor and make arrangements for them to meet your child when he/she arrives home.

Lockdown Drills: On Thursday, September 30th, RES successfully completed its annual school-wide Lockdown Drill. We will be conducting a surprise Lockdown Drill in the very near future. A reminder that all visitors to our school need to sign-in at the office and obtain a visitor's pass before entering into our school hallways. We are teaching our students to report if they see a stranger in our school who is not wearing an visitor's pass. A heartfelt "thank-you" to all parents/guardians for supporting RES' endeavors to ensure that our school continues to be a safe and positive learning environment.

### School Parking/Drop-off Handicapped Zone, Bus Loading Zone:

It would be an understatement to say that Rexton Elementary is a busy spot every morning! With well over 20 school buses (from two school districts), scores of parents driving their children to school, AND over 30 staff members coming to work every day, we often have a very intense traffic situation in front of our school daily! Therefore, we need all parents to follow our rules regarding: 1) not lingering in our "drop-off & handicapped parking zones", 2) using the correct entrances/exits when driving in and out of our school our school throughways, and avoid driving/parking in our Bus Loading Zone. Of course, the reason for having to create these NO PARKING areas is to prevent our young students from being unintentionally injured. We realize that most parents are in a rush to get to work every morning but PLEASE take the time to park your vehicle in our expanded parking lot if you require more time with your child before dropping him/her off at

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## Rexton Elementary's 2010-2011 School Improvement Plan:

There are 3 key components to this year's School Improvement Plan (SIP):

- Cultivate 21st Century Skills: Critical thinking & creative problem solving

Collaboration & Communication

Personal Development & Self-Awareness

Global Citizenship

- NB3: Literacy, Numeracy & Science
- Positive Learning Environment: Bully Prevention & Attendance

In order to be successful in meeting our SIP objectives, we need the <u>continuing support</u> of <u>all</u> RES parents/guardians. RES parents can support their children's learning by:

- A) Reading and writing with/to your child every day.
- B) Practicing addition & subtraction and/or multiplication & division facts with your child; providing meaningful problem solving opportunities for your child daily.
- C) Limiting the amount of time your child spends in front of a screen (TV, video games, computers, etc.) Encouraging children to explore and play outdoors leads to natural opportunities for him/her to think scientifically.
- **D)** Encouraging your child to report incidents of bullying, whether it has happened to them or they have witnessed others being victimized by bullies.
- Ensuring that your child arrives at school on time every morning AND remains in school for the entire instructional day. We need our students to be present in order to guarantee the same opportunities for a quality education and a productive future for all. This year's SIP emphasis on attendance will result in:
- K-2 students who arrive after 8:35 a.m. and students in grades 3-5 who arrive after 8:45
   a.m. being considered late for class.
- Students who arrive at RES after 10:00 a.m. will be recorded as absent for one-half day (because they will have missed their entire Literacy Block).
- Increased monitoring of students who arrive late, absent without a valid excuse, and/or incidents of students being picked-up before dismissal. These actions frequently interrupt our positive learning environment. For example, when our secretary has to call a student down to the office because they are being picked up early. This interrupts the entire class and prevents the teacher from reviewing key learning opportunities at the end of her/his lesson.

**District 16's Attendance Regulations** (including incidents of tardiness and early dismissals) states that: \* When a student is absent 5 days = teacher will phone parent(s)

- When a student is absent more than 5 days = meeting with school Administrator
- When a student is absent More Than 12 Days = meeting with a District Supervisor

We look forward to working in conjunction with all RES parents to ensure that we successfully meet the objectives outlined in RES' 2010-2011 School Improvement Plan.



## Voici Rexton Elementary's French Immersion Class!

Twenty-one of Rexton Elementary's Grade 3 students have just completed their first six weeks in New Brunswick's French Immersion program . RES' very first French Immersion teacher is Ms. Julia Mazerolle.

The primary goal of the Grade 3 French Immersion program is, according to former Education Minister, R. Hache, "to ensure that all our students achieve the critical skills they need for success in the 21st-century global economy. Being able to communicate effectively in your first language, as well as other languages, and understanding and working with other cultures and in the global economy are critical 21st-century skills."

In New Brunswick, all students are exposed to the French language, history and culture in Kindergarten to Grade 2. In Grade 3 French Immersion, students spend the first three months of the school year, approximately three hours per day, learning to speak, read and write in French by exploring topics such as their interests, their preferences, their school and their community.

At the beginning of December, students will ease into full study of language arts, science, social studies, health, and personal development and career planning in French while continuing to build language proficiency.

From the start of Grade 3, mathematics and art are learned in French; music and physical education may be learned in French and/or English. The goal is to have 80 per cent of instructional time in French over the course of the year. Students

have 150 minutes of English language arts instruction per week to support continued development of first language skills. Some topics, such as citizenship and invisible forces, from science and social atuding are as a significant of the science and social atual atua

through English language arts.
